### **Kingman County voters elect Foley, Noblit**

*Incumbents County Commissioner Fred Foley and County Clerk Carol Noblit win new terms*

Kingman County voters have elected incumbent Fred Foley to a new four-year term as District 1 County Commissioner. This was the only contested countywide race on Tuesday's general election ballot.

Foley, from Cheney, was opposed by Libertarian John Kostner of Murdock. Foley received 750 votes to Kostner's 373. There was no Democratic candidate on the ballot.

Foley was appointed to the commission in 2011 to fill the unexpired term of Earl Reno, who moved out of county. This was Foley's first election for the position. His new four-year term will begin Jan. 12, 2015.

District 1 serves portions of 10 townships in eastern areas of the county (eastern two-thirds of White, far northeast corner of Ninnescah, and all of Allen, Bennett, Canton, Dale, Eagle, Evan, Galesburg and Vinita townships). It also includes roughly one-quarter of the City of Kingman (the area generally northeast of the intersection of US 54 Highway and Main Street).

County voters also elected acting County Clerk Carol Noblit. Noblit, a Republican, was appointed last year to fill an unexpired term and was unopposed. She received 2,564 votes. She will serve until the next election cycle in 2016, when the position will be open for a full four-year term. She has worked in the clerk's office since 1995.

The turnout represented nearly 55 percent of the county's 5,375 registered voters. The vote will not be final until the election canvass is held at 8 a.m. Nov. 10 in the County Commission Room at the Kingman County Courthouse.
